

Facts about Congenital Heart Defects

What is a congenital heart defect (CHD)?

- Congenital heart defects are present at birth. CHDs can be structural problems with a baby's heart affecting how blood flows through the body, and/or a CHD may affect a heart's electrical system.
- There are more than 40 types of CHDs and can range in complexity from mild to severe.

How common are congenital heart defects?

- An average of 1 in 100 babies is born with a heart defect. About 1 in 4 babies born with a CHD will have critical congenital heart disease. **CHDs are the most common of all birth defects.**
- It is estimated more than 2 million people in the United States living with congenital heart disease. Because of advances in treatment, people born with CHD are living longer, healthier lives.

What are common symptoms of CHD?

Signs and symptoms depend on type and severity of the defect, although sometimes, there are no obvious symptoms. Common signs and symptoms are:

- very pale or gray skin tone
- blueish-tinted nails or lips that may last or come and go with activity or exertion
- fast, labored or troubled breathing; retracting
- unusual drowsiness
- easily fatigued, unable to stay awake for feeding

Lifelong Care

Even with improved treatments, almost all people with congenital heart disease are never cured, even if their heart has been repaired through surgical intervention.

As a person with CHD grows and ages, more problems may occur. They may need additional medication, surgeries or other procedures throughout their lives to ensure good health. It is very important for people with CHD to pursue lifelong care with a pediatric or adult congenital cardiologist.

Information provided on this request will be kept confidential to the governing board of Broken Hearts of Florida. Please review the entire request form prior to filling it out to ensure eligibility and that application is submitted correctly.

Eligibility Criteria:

Applicant must meet all three levels of criteria.

- You must have a financial need and your financial need must be related to a congenital heart condition or other pediatric heart disease. The following are examples of financial need related to congenital heart condition/pediatric heart disease. (This list does not include all possible situations that may be eligible.):
 - a. patient scheduled for congenital/pediatric heart-related surgery
 - b. congenital/pediatric heart patient has medical crisis related to congenital/pediatric heart condition
 - c. patient must attend heart-related appointment out-of-town (need would include money for gas)
 - d. financial hardship due to unpaid leave from work because of congenital/pediatric heart condition
- Congenital/pediatric heart patient must live in Florida and/or be treated at a Florida-based hospital, clinic or other medical facility.
- Congenital/pediatric heart patient and/or patient's family must have a physician, case manager/nurse, physician's assistant, case/social worker willing to write a letter of support/recommendation.
- Have not met the annual maximum assistance allowed of \$200/year.

Follow these instructions:

1. Fill out form completely. Incomplete forms will not be considered.
2. Secure a minimum of one letter of support/recommendation from your social worker/case worker, physician or nurse.
3. Send the application by fax to 850.668.5865, or scan them and email them to resources@brokenheartsflorida.org , or mail documents to Broken Hearts of Florida, Attn: Kim Rooks, PO Box 180423, Tallahassee, FL 32318.

Once your request is received:

1. Expect a reply within 48 hours letting you know whether your request has been approved.
2. If your request is approved, expect assistance within 5 business days of your initial request.

Home Away From Home Program Criteria / Application Instructions

Broken Hearts of Florida Inc. provides financial assistance to families in need, who have a planned medical procedure, unplanned medical situation or health crisis, need assistance to attend a regular appointment, or are having a financial hardship because of unpaid leave or unemployment directly related to a congenital/pediatric heart condition. Information provided on this request will be kept confidential to the governing board of Broken Hearts of Florida. Please review the entire request form prior to filling it out to ensure eligibility and that application is submitted correctly. Broken Hearts will try to the best of its ability to provide the amount requested, however, financial assistance awards are based not only on applicants' needs, but also on how many other applicants there are, and availability of funds.

Eligibility Criteria:

Applicant must meet all three levels of criteria.

- Home Away From Home is a program specifically for pediatric heart families living in one of these Florida counties: Gadsden, Franklin, Jefferson, Leon, Liberty, Madison, Taylor, Wakulla.
- You must have a financial need and your financial need must be related to a congenital heart condition or other pediatric heart disease. The following are examples of financial need related to congenital heart condition/pediatric heart disease. (This list does not include all possible situations that may be eligible.):
 - a. patient scheduled for congenital/pediatric heart-related surgery
 - b. congenital/pediatric heart patient has medical crisis related to congenital/pediatric heart condition
 - c. patient must attend heart-related appointment out-of-town (need would include money for gas)
 - d. financial hardship due to unpaid leave from work because of congenital/pediatric heart condition
- Congenital/pediatric heart patient must live in Florida and/or be treated at a Florida-based hospital, clinic or other medical facility.
- Congenital/pediatric heart patient and/or patient's family must have a physician, case manager/nurse, physician's assistant, case/social worker willing to write a letters of support/recommendation.
- Family agrees to stay at Ronald McDonald House (if available), one of the three BHF partner hotels (Baymont Inn & Suites, Red Roof Inn, Best Western Plus Gateway Grand), or has negotiated own comparable rate at other hotel
- Have not been granted assistance from Broken Hearts of Florida in the past 12 months.

Follow these instructions:

1. Fill out form completely. Please be sure to explain your situation and why you need financial assistance. Broken Hearts is unable to consider incomplete applications.
2. Secure two letters of support/recommendation from your social worker/case worker, physician or nurse.
 - a. Confirmation of surgery date and estimated length of stay
 - b. Confirmation of financial need

Young heart-disease and transplant survivors gather for day of fun, friendship

GAINESVILLE – When Broken Hearts of Florida throws its annual May Day Picnic at Lake Wauburg in Micanopy, it's a day of laughter and supportive connections for families affected by congenital heart defects (CHD) and other pediatric heart diseases.

Up to 300 people – from all parts of northwest, northeast and central Florida – are expected to gather for BHF's 5th Annual May Day Picnic on May 17, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Cypress Lodge/Lake Wauburg, at the UF Recreational Facility in Micanopy.

"Our families come not only for the awesome activities, but they come to see each other. They want to know how each other's kids are doing," said Kim Rooks, BHF co-founder and executive director of administration and finance, whose 12-year-old daughter Taylor was born with complete heart block, a hole between her ventricles, and with her greater arteries and ventricles reversed. "The support and empathy we can give each other, there's just nothing like it. Nobody understands it better than another parent or another child who's been through it or is going through it."

The picnic also provides a once-a-year opportunity for patients and their families to spend time outside the hospital and clinic setting with their caregivers from the UF Health Congenital Heart Center and UF Health Shands Children's Hospital.

"I love going; it's a chance for me to see the kids we've treated and operated on, and see them running around, full of energy, having fun with each other," said Mark Bleiweis, MD, director and principal cardiothoracic surgeon for the Congenital Heart Center.

Candi Pridemore, who serves as chapter leader for Broken Hearts' Central Florida chapter, said that caregiver bond is vital.

"Congenital heart disease is never cured; our kids need lifelong care," said Pridemore, whose 7-year-old son Sage was born with hypoplastic left heart syndrome, a condition in which the left side of the heart fails to fully develop. "The more comfortable they are with their medical conditions and their caregivers, the more likely they are to take good care of themselves."

This year's picnic will feature a dunk tank (dunk a doctor!), bounce house, water slide, pontoon-and paddle-boat rides, lawn games, and a few special, surprise guests.

"What I love most is watching families hug and talk with each other, kids running around playing, and parents snapping photos of their kids with their favorite doctors and nurses," said Karen Thurston Chavez, co-founder and executive director of operations and outreach. Her 10-year-old son William was born with scimitar syndrome, which affects the right side of his heart and his right lung.

"The picnic represents all the reasons Kim (Rooks) and I started Broken Hearts. When you're with all of our families and their caregivers, you just get a sense that no matter what, everything will be OK."

Now more than at any other time in history, children and adults with congenital heart disease are living longer, healthier, more active lives.

TALLAHASSEE – Broken Hearts of the Big Bend will host its Regional Forum on Congenital Heart Disease on Saturday, Feb. 13, to connect families affected by congenital heart disease (CHD) with expert medical, social and family resources. Most importantly, it will connect families with each other.

The Forum will be held in downtown Tallahassee and is free and open to the public. Speakers include pediatric heart experts from the University of Florida Congenital Heart Center in Gainesville/Jacksonville, a popular blogger among the CHD community, and local experts in social work and marriage and family counseling. Activities for children ages 4 and older will be held for those accompanying adult attendees.
